The Swiss ibex sustainability scheme

A comprehensive sustainability orientation for hotels

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Abstract

'ibex fairstay' is a label for hotels denoting the hotels' level of sustainability performance and management. In a comparative study, the *ibex fairstay* was seen as one of the best sustainability labels in tourism. Some 55 hotels and hostels are certified against the 'ibex' method, a dozen of which with the highest 'platinum' level. The methodology allows a hotel to assess – and ultimately to improve – its sustainability level in five dimensions: management, economic, environmental, societal and regional/cultural. The *ibex fairstay* is built similarly to the ISO management standards (9001 and 14001), but focuses on actual content compared to management system. A full management system according to the Swiss Tourism Quality Program can be built up with the *ibex fairstay* as well, leading to the highest QQQ level. The *ibex fairstay* improves the quality of management as much as it spurs improvements towards more sustainable performance of hotels. The article describes the *ibex fairstay* structure, as well as some detailed analyses of hotels' performance in selected environmental and societal issues, such as energy, waste, staff related management and more. In addition, the article presents learnings from participating hotels and across all ibex certified houses.

1. Introduction

To bring broad sustainability orientation into the hotel business – a key industry of Switzerland – and use its innovation potential, the local NGO "ö-plus" in 2001 asked the authors of this article to develop a full sustainability assessment for hotels: the "*ibex fairstay*" scheme and label¹. Today, some 50 hotels use the ibex for the assessment, improvement and labelling of their environmental, social, cultural, financial and management performance. In 2010, a broad comparative study by Lucerne University on sustainability schemes for hotels and tourism² identified the *ibex fairstay* as one of four top sustainability labels globally.

2. Sustainability in the Swiss hotel sector

Sustainability is a widely discussed topic in Switzerland: societal convictions, a generally high quality of life, and accordingly to the legal framework all support this. The Swiss hotel and tourism organisations have to some extent supported sustainability orientation for many years, mainly with an environmental focus. Formal uptake among hotels was limited, though, with some 10 EU flower labels, 50 ibex labels, next to some self-declared environmental hotels. In this concert, the ibex is the only broad sustainability assessment.

The major quality scheme in Swiss tourism, "Q"³ (not to be confounded with Q, James Bond's chief engineer ...), which exists in three levels (Q to QQQ), covers sustainability issues to a limited extent. While hotel chains often use the ISO management standards (ISO 9001 for Quality Management, ISO 14001 for Environmental Management), the Swiss Q label supported the entry of smaller organisations like individual hotels, cable cars, local bus lines, etc. into the quality management world.

To ease uptake of the ibex, its methodology was enlarged over time and today can include certification against the EU flower label and/or the Swiss QQQ at the same time.

In addition, various other sustainability oriented programs and labels can be found among Swiss hotels and tour operators' signage of hotels. Examples range from the general industry standards on environment (ISO 14001), food safety (ISO 22000) and organisational health and safety (OHSAS

18001)⁴, to the international sector label "Green Globe", against which 11 Swiss hotels are currently certified⁵, the European Ecolabel for hotels⁶, to local or even individual sustainability charters⁷.

3. The structure of the ibex: ecology, society, culture, finance, management

The ibex fairstay scheme⁸ consists of

- . a systematic assessment in 5 dimensions: *environmental, social, cultural and regional, financial,* and *management* quality;
- . the assessment of performance in all these dimensions;
- . a certification system, with tri-annual external audit and independent certification board.

The ibex assesses a hotel based on criteria and on activities, in all five dimensions mentioned above. With better performance and more activities, a hotel gets a higher ranking, from bronze (= entry level) to platinum ibex. Roughly a dozen out of some 55 hotels and hostels currently carry a platinum ibex.

Examples of performance assessment and of activity assessment are given in the following table:
